
This lamp was inspired by Apollo the Greek god of the sun. The dark body of the lamp contrasted with the bright light emitted portrays the ongoing battle between Apollo and Dionysus. When the light glows it casts a veil over the darkness creating an illusion of rationality and safety however this is only temporary before the Dionysian world eventually will over power the light of Apollo.

THE WHITE TIGER

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Inspired by the Chinese Constellations the white tiger represents the West and symbolizes the autumn season. According to Chinese legends the white tiger would only appear when the emperor ruled with complete virtue and if there was peace across the land. Incense sits in the palm of the tigers hand creating a tranquil atmosphere around the room, additionally the markings represent the starts that make up the tiger in the cosmos.

VASES OF ALOADAE

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These two vases represent the two giant brothers Otus and Ephialtes who are collectively known as Aloadae, sons of Aloeus however they were in fact the sons of Poseidon, god of the sea, after Aloeus' wife Iphimedea had fallen in love with him. The act of filling the vases with water represents the secret infertility of Iphimdea. The names Otus and Epialtes translate to mean Doom and Nightmare yet it is said that the two brothers were beautiful and often depicted as heros saving their mother and step sisters from pirates. Eventually Apollo killed the Aloeus after they attacked Mount Olympus.

VESUVIUS INCENSE BURNER

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
Historic fresco paintings from Pompeii depict Dionysus to be a much loved deity among the people who lived there. Vesuvius was the mountain on which he partied and drank the wines produced in Pompeii. It is thought that he was so highly respected due to the fertility of the land surrounding Versuvius. The smoke that comes from the top of the incense burner imitates the heat that lies underneath the surface, additionally the black outer colour represents the destruction and darkness that would eventually destroy the fertile and colourful land of Pompei
